

Who We Are



The United Church of Christ

Our faith is 2,000 years old. Our thinking is not. We believe in God's continuing testament. This is why we are committed to hearing God's ancient story anew and afresh in our lives and in the world today. We try to remain attentive to God's creative movement in the world. Religion and science are not mutually exclusive, and your head and heart are both welcomed into our places of worship. We prepare our members and leaders to be engaged in ministry in the present and future church, and we embrace all kinds of communities and new modes of thinking.

"God is still speaking" is a campaign by the United Church of Christ (UCC) to remind us that God still has a lot more to say.

Why? No matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here.

- We believe in extravagant welcome. This is why we insist that God's communion table is open, not closed, and God's gift and claim in baptism are irrevocable.
- We advocate justice for all. Our congregations extend hospitality as a sign of God's inclusive love. We teach that offering bread to those in search of it is God's mission. Our perspective is global, not provincial.
- We work with not against people of other faiths.

Why? Never place a period where God has placed a comma.

- We believe the church's mission is to change lives individually, systemically, and globally. We work to make transformation possible, but trust in God's grace. This is why we insist that churches must be places of vitality in worship, learning, and advocacy.
- We are committed to working for justice, and we believe that lives are changed through global experiences and friendships. Because God is still speaking...

What we believe

- We believe in the triune God: Creator; resurrected Christ, the sole Head of the church; and the Holy Spirit, who guides and brings about the creative and redemptive work of God in the world.
- We believe that each person is unique and valuable. It is the will of God that
 every person belongs to a family of faith where they have a strong sense of
 being valued and loved.
- We believe that each person is on a spiritual journey and that each of us is at a different stage of that journey.
- We believe that the persistent search for God produces an authentic relationship with God, engendering love, strengthening faith, dissolving guilt, and giving life purpose and direction.
- We believe that all of the baptized 'belong body and soul to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.'
- No matter who, no matter what, no matter where we are on life's journey, notwithstanding race, gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, class or creed, we all belong to God and to one worldwide community of faith.
- All persons baptized past, present, and future are connected to each other and to God through the sacrament of baptism.
- We baptize during worship when the community is present because baptism includes the community's promise of 'love, support and care' for the baptized, and we promise that we won't take it back no matter where your journey leads you.
- We believe that all people of faith are invited to join Christ at Christ's table for the sacrament of Communion. Just as many grains of wheat are gathered to make one loaf of bread and many grapes are gathered to make one cup of wine, we, the many people of God, are made one in the body of Christ, the church.
- The breaking of bread and the pouring of wine reminds us of the costliness of Christ's sacrifice and the discipleship to which we are all called. In the breaking of bread, we remember and celebrate Christ's presence among us along with a 'cloud of witnesses' our ancestors, family, and friends who have gone before us. It is a great mystery; we claim it by faith.

The UCC has no rigid formulation of doctrine or attachment to creeds or structures. Its overarching creed is love. The UCC pastors and teachers are known for their commitment to excellence in theological preparation, interpretation of the scripture, and justice advocacy. Even so, love and unity in the midst of our diversity are our greatest assets.

- We believe that God calls us to be servants in the service of others and to be good stewards of the earth's resources. 'To believe is to care; to care is to do.'
- We believe that the UCC is called to be a prophetic church. As in the tradition of the prophets and apostles, God calls the church to speak truth to power, liberate the oppressed, care for the poor, and comfort the afflicted.
- We believe in the power of peace and work for nonviolent solutions to local, national, and international problems.
- We are a people of possibility.

In the UCC, members, congregations, and structures have the breathing room to explore and to hear ... for after all, God is still speaking...

The UCC Firsts

The UCC was founded in 1957 and goes back to the first Pilgrims in America in 1620. With over 5,000 churches and nearly one million members across the U.S., the UCC serves God in the co-creation of a just and sustainable world. The UCC is known for its welcoming stance toward all people. Ours was the first historically white denomination to ordain an African American (in the 18th century), the first in the modern era to ordain a woman (in the 19th century), and the first to ordain an openly gay man (in the 20th century).

We were in the forefront of the anti-slavery movement. We founded the first institutions of higher learning in America (Harvard, Yale) and were among the first to establish schools and colleges for newly freed slaves (Fisk, Dillard). We were early leaders in the Social Gospel movement, taking seriously Jesus' commandment to "love your neighbor as yourself."

The UCC Purpose Statement from the Gospel of Matthew

To love God with all our heart, mind, soul, and strength and our neighbor as ourselves.

The UCC Vision

United in Christ's love, a just world for all.

The UCC Mission statement

United in Spirit and inspired by God's grace, we welcome all, love all, and seek justice for all.

The UCC Values

Love

Right relationships define love. Love is a communal experience enacting love of neighbor, self, and God. Love has a narratable timeline; something happening drawing one out of oneself and extending self. The community speaks love through a narration of their story including presence to both joy and pain in the midst of loving.

Spirituality/Faith

Spirituality and faith is born out in communities which are connected to something bigger than themselves, and bigger than the great cloud of witnesses (past, present, and future), while adding to the Christian story.

Community

Community, a gathering body of individuals that speaks to live out the teachings of Jesus Christ, means interdependence, connection, honoring of difference, with the equal distribution and sharing of power and resources for all.

Justice

Justice speaks truth to power. Justice is what love looks like in public and through the eyes of God. Justice creates opportunities for wholeness and health in individuals and communities. Justice is connected to the surrounding community in the building of coalitions and partnerships. Justice is intersectional; so the faith community is also facing outward. Justice ensures the voice of the voiceless and serves the underserved, inviting the tradition and wisdom of voices historically excluded and/or undervalued. Justice repairs the breaches and restores right relationships. Justice is the equitable allocation of resources for God's beloved children.

Creativity

The ministry takes a bold and innovative approach and/or applies the old model in a new way to address a particular need within the community.

Our Denominational Connections

Friends Congregational Church belongs to the **Heart of Texas Association** which is, in turn, a part of the **South Central Conference**, United Church of Christ. The 5,000 UCC churches are divided into 38 Conferences. The South Central Conference contains four Associations: The Heart of Texas, Houston, New Orleans, and North Texas.

Heart of Texas Association

The Heart of Texas (HOT) Association is divided into six geographical areas with a total of 21 churches: Austin Area (8 churches), Bryan-College Station - Brenham Area (4 churches), Weimar Area (1 church), New Braunfels Area (3 churches), San Antonio Area (2 churches), and Corpus Christi Area (2 churches). Representatives are designated by individual churches to serve on various HOT committees. (hotaucc.org)

South Central Conference



The Heart of Texas Association is one of four Associations making up the South Central Conference, United Church of Christ, which is a partnership of congregations, associations, and ministries of the United Church of Christ throughout Texas, Louisiana, and Mississippi. The South Central Conference UCC is a tapestry of God's beautiful diversity. (https://sccucc.org/)

General Synod

Every two years, the larger UCC church hosts its General Synod, a gathering of ecumenical leaders, members, delegates, and community from across the world for a time of worship, reflection, and the work of the church. Highlights include addressing the current issues facing the larger church and experiencing the connectivity between the national church and the local church.

Friends Church was founded in October 1977 by a group of faithful people with a vision to start a church that would share the joyful message of the gospel.

Our initial worship space was at the old Consolidated High School, then in homes, then the Girls Club, then the Middle School library, and finally at South Knoll Elementary School cafeteria. We have been worshipping in our current location on Harvey Mitchell Parkway and Southwood Drive in College Station since November 13, 1983.

Friends Church Covenant

Just one year after its formation, an important event took place in the life of Friends Church. During an all church retreat in November 1978, this young congregation wrote the following covenant. This important formative event was achieved through faith, love, and prayer.

We recognize that we were strangers, that we came from diverse backgrounds, that we share a longing for acceptance and a need for mutual support.

We need to celebrate our love of God with joy, enthusiasm, and faith.

In faith we gather as Friends Congregational Church to experience community, to celebrate old traditions, and to affirm our new creations.

Looking outward, we recognize the need to embrace the world and invite others to share mutual gifts. Our spiritual journey is sustained by the God of Biblical history as expressed by Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, and Rebekah, and most clearly by Jesus of Nazareth.

We celebrate the continuity of our faith and live in its mystery.

Friends Church Statement of Purpose

As a commitment to God's call to ministry, Friends Church prayerfully adopted the following statements in March 1992:

We are Friends Congregational Church* (UCC), called by God to gather as disciples of Jesus Christ:

- to be a welcoming community, open to diversity;
- to worship God with joyful hearts and open minds;
- to be a family of care, support, and trust;
- to include children fully in the life and ministry of the church;
- to grow in faith and service;
- to witness to God's love for all people;
- to strive for justice and peace; and
- to invite others to share our journey.

We, as a diverse body of believers seeking to live in the light and image of God in Christ, affirm:

- that as agents of reconciliation and wholeness we will continue our efforts toward inclusiveness, embrace all who are disenfranchised from the religious community, and stand against all forms of discrimination;
- that in light of the Gospel we will empower ourselves, our children, and one another to be fully present in the world, living in Christ's image.


Accessible to All Commitment


Sanctuary Resolution

BE IT RESOLVED, that Friends Congregational Church UCC, College Station, TX, declares itself an "Immigrant Welcoming Congregation."

In making this declaration, we covenant and commit ourselves to the Word of God concerning the practices of Christian hospitality, protection, and advocacy alongside and on behalf of the immigrant and refugees in our community. Together, we will continue to develop practices and programs that facilitate the respectful welcome and inclusion of immigrants into our congregation and community.

We make this covenant understanding that it is grounded in scripture and our faith. God, the Creator, Christ, and Holy Spirit, calls upon all people of faith to support our immigrant sisters and brothers.

We make this covenant recognizing that the world is in the midst of a long-term refugee crisis with millions of God's people displaced, seeking safety, security, freedom, and opportunity. We also recognize many immigrants continue to fear raids, deportation, and the disintegration of their families.





Providing physical sanctuary and public advocacy for individuals approved by the process designated by the congregation. To be considered for sanctuary, the individual(s) must fill the following criteria:

- Live in the Bryan/College Station community
- Imminent deportation threatens their family's unity or personal safety
- Have legal representation
- Reasonable chance of having a positive resolution to their deportation order

Providing spiritual support through regular prayer and discernment on behalf of our immigrant neighbors.

Hosting educational events for the edification of our fellowship and community related to these issues.

Our efforts will not include any of the following:

Providing "cover" or harbor for individuals suspected or convicted of a violent crime as defined by the Federal Bureau of Investigations Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

Providing support for individuals residing in the U.S. without proper documentation when there is no clear or present threat to the unity of a family or personal safety.

The process we will follow will include, but not be limited to:

Approval of individual(s) by above criteria. Given that decisions need to occur very quickly, the Ad Hoc Sanctuary Committee proposes that a small committee consisting of Pastors and Moderator or Vice-Moderator be empowered to decide if an individual seeking sanctuary fits the criteria set out previously and be given sanctuary.

Make a public announcement to officials, authorities, and community through a media campaign of our decision to provide sanctuary to an individual under threat of deportation.

Church Clarity Commitment



The goal of Church Clarity is to create a consistent standard of clarity for how church policy should be communicated. Clear policies communicate standardized expectations so that people know what to expect, without having to rely on a 'whisper network'.

In the 21st century, an organization's website is essentially its digital "front door." Websites serve as a centralized location for the public to understand critical information about an organization, so they know what to expect.

Publicly stated policies provide a way for congregants to hold church leadership accountable to its commitments.

Clarity is a crowd-sourced database of local congregations scored on how clearly they communicate their actively enforced policies. The mission of Church Clarity is to increase the standard of clarity throughout the Church Industry of church policy disclosure. The best score earned, Verified Clear, is earned by application and review. It is then published on a public database.

Senior Pastor, the Reverend Dr. Dan De Leon

Pastor Dan has served Friends Congregational Church, United Church of Christ (UCC), since September 1, 2005. During that time, his devotion to the inclusion of all people in the life and ministry of our church, his heart for youth being the future and present of the Church, and his passion for social justice that carries the congregation beyond the walls of our sanctuary have fostered the identity of Friends Church as a Gospel-rooted community that seeks to love God, love people, and love creation in all that we do. Whether he is in the pulpit preaching, in the classroom teaching, at the coffee shop listening, in the public square marching, in the sanctuary strumming guitar, or at the table of communion breaking bread and pouring the cup, Pastor Dan leads by demonstrating that it's more than okay to be human, it's altogether good.



In the College Station community known as "Aggieland," Pastor Dan serves as an Aggie Ally, providing support for gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender students of Texas A&M University. In April of 2013, he was awarded the Phyllis R. Frye Advocacy Award by the Department of Multicultural Services at TAMU for showing "great leadership in the advancement of GLBTI (Gay Lesbian Bisexual Transgender Intersex) civil rights at the infrastructural and/or interpersonal level." He has also served on the Board for

United Campus Ministry of Aggieland since 2005, which ministers to college students of the Presbyterian Church (USA) and the UCC at Texas A&M University and Blinn College of Bryan.

In service to the wider church, from 2013 to 2017, Pastor Dan served on the UCC's South Central Conference Board of Directors as Vice President (2013-2015) and then President (2015-2017). He also served on the Nominating Committee for the National UCC from 2013 to 2017 as Vice Chair for the 2015-2016 biennium, and Chair for the 2016-2017 biennium.

Pastor Dan previously served as the Associate Minister to Youth at Highland Park Baptist Church in Austin, Texas, and, prior to that, as the Interim Youth Minister at First Baptist Church of Austin. He holds a Bachelor of Journalism in Public Relations from the University of Texas at Austin, as well as a Master of Divinity and Doctor of Ministry from Brite Divinity School at Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, Texas. He was ordained into the ministry of the Gospel of Jesus Christ on January 20, 2002.

Rev. De Leon is married to Stacy De Leon, and they are proud parents to son, Mac, born in March of 2005 and daughter Ruthie, born in January 2008.





Associate Pastor, the Reverend Trent Williams

Pastor Trent began his ministry with Friends as Associate Pastor in October 2016, although this is not his first time serving with us. He served as Pastoral Intern in 2006-07 during his final year of seminary at Brite Divinity School, from which he earned an M.Div in 2007.

A native of Waco, Texas, Trent attended Baylor University where he earned a BA in Religion and History. Ordained in 2008 in the United Church of Christ, he served congregations in Pennsylvania and New Jersey before returning to Texas in 2016.

Seeking God: Worship and Music, Faith Formation

Worship

As a progressive Christian community, we seek to deepen our relationship with God and one another in vital, uplifting worship that inspires and nurtures us for the journey of life.



Sunday Morning Worship Services

Worship is the heart of what we do as a faith community. It is what sends us out to serve and restores us when the world has diminished our spirits.



Our two weekly worship services typically include elements of music, prayer, reflection, scripture reading, a special children's message, offering, and a sermon. We take part in communion in one or both services every week that is open to all, including children. To listen to a sample of the type of sermon you might hear on any given Sunday check out our online archive of sermons (www.friends-ucc.org/wordpress). We also stream our 1100 am worship services on the Friends Church Facebook Live, YouTube, and the Friends Church Website.

We welcome children in our worship service. We include a weekly Children's Message in our service that is especially popular! For those who would like, there are crayons and children's worship guides available in the foyer. During the service, childcare is



provided for ages one to five in the preschool room located at the end of the Southside hallway.

Other Offerings to Watch For:



Midweek Spiritual Formation

Midweek Spiritual Formation offers intimate gatherings that combine worship and education to yield a midweek experience that nurtures our spirituality and informs our discipleship with Christ. After an opening prayer, we enjoy a time of learning that includes group discussion or Q&A depending on the format of each week's presentation. The program concludes with a brief time of worship where communion is served.



Dinner church (1st Thursdays)

Peacemeal is "Dinner Church" that is a new kind of worship gathering. There is a time to sing, pray, hear the ancient stories, celebrate communion--and eat together (potluck style)! The setting is all around tables, shared with

friends old and new. Arrive anytime between 6:00 and 6:30 to help set up, and service will begin at 6:30pm. All are Welcome.

Music



Our Director of Music Ministries

A native of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Chris Hoffman has served as our Director of Music Ministries since 2006. He holds a Bachelor's Degree in Voice from the University of Northern Iowa, and a Master's Degree in Vocal Performance from Stephen F. Austin State University. Mr. Hoffman currently resides in College Station, where he maintains a private voice and piano studio. An active performer, Mr. Hoffman continues to perform as an operatic and concert soloist in Brazos Valley and around the country. Other

credentials include performing as a collaborative pianist with various soloists and ensembles, conducting orchestras and coaching vocals for musicals, and conducting orchestras for various Masterwork performances.

Music Ensembles

At Friends Congregational Church, we have a wide variety of wonderful musical ensembles that are centered around praising and worshipping God. For our congregants, music speaks to everyone differently, and it is our hope that there is something for everyone musically to help uplift and inspire people during their worship experience. Whether you have gifts to offer as a singer, handbell ringer, or instrumentalist, Friends Church Music Ministry offers each participant the opportunity for spiritual, musical, and interpersonal development.

The Chancel Choir

The Chancel Choir is the flagship ensemble of the Music Ministries Department and is open to any singer in high school and beyond. It is directed by Chris Hoffman. Rehearsals are held in the Sanctuary on Wednesdays from 7:30 pm until 9:00 pm.



The Chancel Choir provides choral music for the Sunday Worship Services. The musical offerings of this group include Renaissance a cappella pieces, major oratorio choral movements, gospel selections, contemporary Christian...and more! Additionally, they are the centerpiece for the Friends Church annual Christmas Cantata/Masterwork and Good Friday Cantata/Masterwork. Recent highlights include performances of Vivaldi's "Gloria" and Rutter's "Magnificat" during the Christmas season, and Mozart's "Requiem," Forrest's "Requiem for the Living," and Choplins' "Once Upon a Tree" on Good Friday.

The Chancel Choir also provides music for special services, ordinations, and memorial services. The group takes a summer hiatus in July.

Youth Choir

The Youth Choir knocks it out of the park with contemporary arrangements, including pop, rap, jazz, and soul styles. They are directed by Chris Hoffman and Tami Dudo (a congregational volunteer), and are accompanied by our own incredible musician, Pastor Dan, on guitar. This group rehearses during the Sunday Youth Group time. They sing for three-four Services a year. We look forward to expanding this aspect of our Music Ministry.

A Joyful Noise

The Children's Choir, A Joyful Noise, sings for Children's Sabbath Sunday as well as the fifth Sunday of the month. This group of music makers is open to any youth from pre-kindergarten to eighth grade. It is co-directed by Chris Hoffman and Tami Dudo. Rehearsals are held on Sundays in the Sanctuary, during Sunday School time. The rehearsal schedule is light; they practice just a few weeks before the Sunday they are scheduled to sing. A Joyful Noise also joins the Chancel Choir on occasion for Christmas Cantata/Masterwork performances. The annual Christmas Pageant includes our Joyful Noise singers!

The Handbell Choir

The Handbell Choir is made up of our own four-octave handbell set (with a borrowed fifth octave on occasion). This group is open to any musician, from junior high to adult. This ensemble rehearses in the Sanctuary on Monday evenings at 7:30. They perform once a month (usually the second Sunday of the month), as well as special services (such as Easter and Christmas Eve). It is directed by Chris Hoffman.

Rainbow Bells

Designed for the children of Friends, and easy to learn. This special event with the children always draws a resounding round of applause after they perform.

Rehearsals last for just a few minutes during Sunday School time, a couple weeks before they are scheduled to ring. It is directed by Chris Hoffman and Tami Dudo.

Other Musical Opportunities - Vocal or Instrumental

If you have a love of worshipping through music, but the above ensembles aren't exactly the right fit for you, you can still get plugged in! Instrumentalists are always needed for the Chamber Orchestra that accompanies the Chancel Choir for Cantata/Masterwork performances, or as obbligato instruments that accompany certain Choral Anthems. Guitarists and drummers are always welcome for contemporary praise songs. And if you love to sing, but the rehearsal schedule of the Chancel Choir doesn't fit in with your schedule, we can always program special music offerings that feature soloists and ensembles. Faith Formation

We welcome people of all ages for spiritual growth and Christian education opportunities that deepen our faith and build relationships that last for a lifetime.

Adult Sunday School

- Morning Manna: This class explores scripture-based and lectionary-based Bible study and engages in wide-ranging discussions, deepening our understanding of how our still-speaking God can help us respond to today's issues.
- Social Justice: This adult Sunday School class examines how Christians of
 conscience can respond to the hurts and challenges of the world and aims to
 explore how spiritual beliefs inform our daily life and our interactions with the
 world. Various speakers plus class-led volunteers facilitate the Sunday
 morning discussions.

Prayer Labyrinth

The Friends Church labyrinth was constructed by members and friends of our church and was dedicated and consecrated to the glory of God on September 20th, 2003 as part of our 25th anniversary of ministry in the Brazos Valley. It is located behind the church near the edge of the property. It is based on the Santa Rosa labyrinth pattern developed by Lea Goode-Harris. It is a seven circuit labyrinth constructed from bark mulch, crushed granite, and limestone with modifications that include the natural terrain of the location.



Prayer labyrinths have been around for 3500 years in many cultures and arose as a symbol of a metaphorical journey to Jerusalem to walk in the steps of Jesus. All labyrinths are designed so that there is an entrance, one pathway, a center or goal, and one exit. Unlike mazes, labyrinths are not puzzles with dead ends to be figured out. There is only one path.

The Friends Church labyrinth is open to all. We request that it be honored as "holy space". There may be some occasions when you are walking the labyrinth with others. It is customary for all to observe silence in respect of each other's time and space.

Our Amazing Children and Youth!

Our youth and children are fully included in the life of the church and we endeavor to help them develop and grow relationships, have fun, and learn about our collective walk with Christ together.

We welcome the participation of children and youth in our life and worship and want families to feel at home at Friends. We invite our youth to participate in worship as Greeters and Lay Leaders and to serve our church as Child Care Helpers. Youth may participate in our Sunday School classes, our Church Choir, with our Worship Musicians, and our Friends Church Youth Group. Our children's choir, *Joyful Noise*, participates in special church services throughout the year, including Children's Sabbath Sunday and our annual Christmas pageant. We encourage parents to bring their children to worship, to come forward for the Children's Sermon, to participate in our Sunday School program, and to include their children in all the ministry and program events in the life of our church. Childcare is provided for worship services.

Children and Youth Sunday School

- Our youngest class of K-Grade 3 children experience the unique Godly Play
 program taught by Anne Wehrly and Doris Machinski, two passionate and
 talented volunteers, who have received special training for this curriculum.
 The classes use props and storytelling to create a world of wonder through
 which children access the yearlong cycle of Bible stories.
- For **Grades 4-12**, we have a rich curriculum, supplemented with readings, music, projects, and crafts. It follows the Revised Common Lectionary, linking classroom to worship experience, and strives to be global, inclusive, and ecumenical, encouraging children to engage their imaginations, using the arts to explore the beauty, truth, and humane spirit that comes from God.

Sunday Youth Group

Our Youth Group, for 6th through 12th grade, meets most Sundays in the double classroom. We share in activities to learn more about and support one another, our congregation, and our community. We explore topics such as open and affirming, racial justice, access for all, and caring for our planet. We develop relationships, have fun, and learn about our walk with Christ together through this fruitful ministry.

Youth Mission Trips, Lock-ins, and Activities

The Summer Mission trip is a week-long experience of working with local organizations in various communities throughout the United States. The week energizes the youth group and adults alike to be about Jesus' proclamation of bringing good news to the poor. See below for examples of lock-ins and activities.

Children and Youth Mission Activities

The children and youth participate regularly in activities and fundraisers that help engage in and build a foundation of service outward to our congregation and community as an integral part of living out our mission. Some of these include UNICEF and Heifer International, Reach Beyond Mission, Souper Bowl of Caring, Rise Against Hunger meal packaging event, volunteering monthly at the Brazos Church Pantry, the Bryan College Station Crop Walk, and other local mission activities.

Youth Representatives in Church Governance

Our youth are invited to serve as representatives on the Programs Ministry Team and on the Board of Trustees. These are one-year positions with a commitment to provide the youth perspective and a voice for the youth of the Congregation in all aspects of our church life.

Historical Highlights of Mission Trips and other youth activities

- 1998 Summer: Paint and Patch Mission Trip to New Orleans with 5-7 youth and 5 adults
- 2009 November 20-21: Overnight lock-in at Church of the Savior, Austin, a benefit for Habitat for Humanity



- 2011 April 30: Joint morning of service with Church of the Savior, Austin and FCC youth at the Brazos Valley Food Bank
- July 9-13: National Youth Event, Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana with 3,000 youth from across the country. Activities included workshops, worship services, service projects, and more. Six youth and three adults attended.
- February 22-23: 30-hour Famine lock-in with FCC and United Christian Church, Austin youth groups
 - July 5-12: Youth Mission trip with several Austin youth groups to Livingston, Alabama for a week of work projects, education, worship, and community building.
- 2015 February 28-March 1: 30-Hour Famine Lock-in at United Christian Church, Austin
 - July 5-11: Youth Mission trip to East Dallas with Reach Beyond Mission



- June 26-29: Youth Mission trip to WacoJuly 24-31: National Youth Event held in Orlando, Florida
- 2017 July 2-9: Youth Mission Trip to Washington DC with Reach Beyond Mission
- 2018 July: Reach Beyond Mission trip to Austin, working with local organizations Mobile Loaves and Fishes, Sustainability Food Center, and the Capitol Area Food Bank, Community First!
- July: Trip to Birmingham, Alabama, working with Urban Ministry, a local mission of the United Methodist Church to assist residents in breaking out of cyclical poverty through home repair and painting, a community garden, and community café.
- July: Hybrid mission trip working with Reach Beyond Mission, where the group volunteered doing local service projects during the day and engaged in online learning with Reach Beyond Mission in the mornings and evenings. The group learned about the effects of systemic racism on matters of food justice, housing affordability, immigration, voter suppression, and medical debt. What they learned spurred the group to start a campaign buying up medical debt portfolios for pennies on the dollar to forgive \$4 million in debt for people in the Brazos Valley and beyond.

Confirmation Classes for Youth Grades 4-12

This biannual five-month long program offers a structured pathway toward confirmation at Friends Congregational Church. The senior pastor and congregational co-leaders participate in weekly meetings, field trips to local communities of faith, youth group activities, and retreats. Each confirmand is asked to invite an adult member of the congregation to act as their mentor during this time. Each week the confirmand meets with their mentor and reviews their weekly assignments on a variety of topics, such as God, Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit, the Trinity, prayer, the sacraments, the Church, etc. The leadership team

puts together the assignments, field trips, activities and retreats, and the classes. The confirmands are also asked to serve in leadership roles in Sunday services (lay leader, bread runner for communion, greeter, children's message) during this process. This five-month commitment is rigorous, rich, and very rewarding for all.

Small Group Ministries

Fabulous at Any Age (FAA)

FAA was formed in 2013 and offers monthly excursions to explore our area, learn about other cultures and religions, and assist with mission projects from the congregation. The group meets for lunch and a group activity, excursion, tour, lecture, or fellowship.

Families with Young Children

Families with Young Children provides support and fellowship for those who are parenting children while offering a fun environment for the children.

Inquiry Classes

The Inquiry Class is designed for friends who are interested in knowing more about Friends Church and the United Church of Christ. It is an intentional gathering time with the pastors, seasoned and new members, and visitors to learn and ask questions in a welcoming environment. Inquiry classes offer a time for visitors and guests to learn more about joining our congregation. We share our faith journeys and learn about the opportunities for faith formation and service to our community as we listen for the still-speaking God.

Parents of Teens (POT)

POT Parties are a chance to connect with other families with teenagers. Your teens don't have to be living with you or even living at home anymore; all are welcome. Teens and other children are welcome to attend.

Real Life Theology

This periodic gathering is scheduled and hosted by individual members of Friends Church with an invited speaker and subsequent discussion about their personal spiritual journeys

Soul Friends Small Group Ministry



Small group ministries offer deeper connections and relationships with each other in our faith community while exploring, nurturing, and growing in our spirituality together. Small groups give us an opportunity to nurture spiritual growth in a supportive and safe setting and to share the joys and concerns in our lives.

Small groups form around monthly book studies, short term special interest studies such as "Queering the Bible", and contemplative prayer groups that broaden and deepen our relationship with God. Groups are formed throughout the year and are available to all. Look for announcements of new groups forming or ongoing groups to join in This Week @ Friends and the Quarterly Magazine, the Epistle. Days and times will vary to accommodate as many different schedules as possible. 
The Journey – A Spiritual Renewal Retreat

The Journey is a three-day spiritual renewal retreat that was developed at Friends Church in 1998. The weekend offers a Biblical look at Christianity as a lifestyle. It is a short course of basic Christian principles and practices presented through a highly structured weekend of study, prayer, and fellowship. Like other spiritual renewal events in the Cursillo Tradition, The Journey brings the individual to an encounter with Christ as part of God's grace-filled community. The Journey is designed to strengthen and renew the faith of Christian people, and through them, their families, congregations, and the world in which they live. The Journey is an effort toward the renewal of the church. The Journey is a 72-hour co-

educational and inclusive weekend for adults over 18 that begins on Thursday evening and ends on Sunday evening. This experience is typically offered once per year at Camp Crucis near Granbury, Texas.

Slumber Falls Camp Retreat

Slumber Falls is a UCC owned camp located on the Guadalupe River just outside of



New Braunfels, Texas. Slumber Falls Camp is where Friends Church holds its annual church retreat weekend and has been a favorite for

families, singles, couples, for the young and old for decades. It is traditionally held on Mother's Day Weekend. Campers arrive on Friday evening and gather around games, campfire, or just enjoy each other on the large outdoor gathering area. A pastor or lay led program is offered on Saturday morning with the afternoon free to float the river, explore the historical and picturesque town of Gruene's shops and restaurants, or bike in the beautiful hill country. Saturday

evening is a shared dinner with fun, games, music, and getting to know each other. Sunday morning worship is held at the beautiful and rustic chapel at Vesper Point that overlooks the Guadalupe River. We've even been known to hold a baptism in the River!



Exploring Membership at Friends Church





Fifty fine folks came together Sunday afternoon, 3/31/19, to Rise Against Hunger. In a little over an hour, we packaged 10,000 meals that will provide healthy food to our neighbors around the world who are struggling with hunger.

What does joining the church mean?

In our tradition, joining the church matters. To prepare for that event, there are quarterly Inquiry Classes where you will meet with the pastors and church leaders. When you are ready and the time is right, new members will be invited, during Sunday worship, to make a commitment to God and with our faith community.

When you join a church, you become a voting member of the church. Members vote on the church's Statement of Faith and Mission (budget) each year, they vote on which of the members should serve as key leaders, and they even vote on whether to call a new pastor. There are important practical issues associated with being a member.

When you join, you make a connection, you join a community and make a

covenant. A covenant is an exchange of holy promises. In making a covenant we promise to serve God together. It's not just new members who join the church. Rather, everyone—new members and existing members—joins one another. As we make our promises to one another we remember God's promises to us and promise to serve God as best we are able. In the Bible, God



makes covenants with people all the time. Since we believe that God is still speaking, we still believe that the holy promises we make to each other matter. This is a significant decision.

Your faith background

When new members join the church, we often give thanks for every place that has ever been your spiritual home. When you join a church, you do so at one moment in time, and that does not take the place of any other church. When you join a church, you are not saying that this church is superior to all others. But you are saying that while you are here, you will be an active part of this congregation.

Attending worship

Worship is open to everybody, at any time, and you can worship in all sorts of places, not just this church. Joining the church is different from worshipping God. You can praise God on a mountaintop or while the plane lands after a bumpy flight. You can gather with a group of people in church or on a lakeshore to worship. But when you join a local church, you are saying that you have chosen this community of faith to be your spiritual home at this time. When you join, you tell the community, "I'm in," and they in turn make promises to support you on your faith journey together. One of the things they will promise is to join you in the amazing adventure of prayer. You will now be part of something larger than yourself and your own private journey.

What else am I agreeing to when I join a church?

You will be asked to participate fully in the life of the church through worship and serving others. And should some situation make it impossible to be with your church physically, stay connected by attending through online worship, by prayer, and in service. Serving others, as you are able, is an essential and rewarding component of church life.

Serving Others

Stewardship and Giving

At Friends Church we believe that our giving is in time, talent, and treasure. We believe that giving is to share with our church, our community, and the world. God is generous and so must we be.

Each fall we dream together about what God is calling Friends Church to do in the coming year, and we plan our budget goals, to which we ask members and friends to prayerfully consider giving. Pledging in time, in talent, and in financial resources is the opportunity to commit to being a part of changing lives through the mission and ministry of Friends.

Beyond our own annual stewardship campaign, Friends Church supports five national church offerings in addition to our Friends Church offering. We also support many other charities as we are able.

The special offerings include:



One Great Hour of Sharing (March)

One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS), through the UCC, works with international partners to provide sources of

clean water, food, education and health care, small business micro-credit, advocacy and resettlement for refugees and displaced persons, and emergency relief and rehabilitation. OGHS also supports domestic and international ministries for disaster preparedness and response.



Strengthen the Church (May)

Strengthen the Church (STC) is a special mission offering to reimagine and build the future of the UCC. Shared at the conference and national levels, STC largely supports

youth ministries and full-time leaders for new churches in parts of the country where the UCC does not have a strong presence. It also provides support for existing church's new initiatives.



Neighbors in Need (October)

Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the UCC that supports ministries of justice and compassion

throughout the United states. One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. The NIN grants are awarded to churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. These grants fund projects whose work ranges from direct service to community organizing and advocacy to address systemic injustice. Funding is provided through donations to the NIN offering.



Christmas Fund (December)

The Christmas Fund for the Veterans of the Cross and the Emergency Fund is a Special Mission Offering that

congregations have been supporting for over 100 years. The offering is administered through the United Church Board for Ministerial Assistance, the charitable arm of the Pension Boards. Funds provide direct financial support to those who serve the church and are facing financial difficulties. Active and retired clergy, lay employees, and their surviving spouses may be eligible for the Supplementation of Small Annuities, Supplementation of Health Premiums, Emergency Grants, and/or Christmas "Thank You" Gift Checks.



Our Church's Wider Mission (Monthly)

Because we believe in transformation, we believe the church's mission is changing lives -individually,

systemically and globally... we support, encourage, and uplift local churches where lives are being changed through worship, education, fellowship, mission, and justice advocacy. We identify, recruit, educate, and support leaders who inspire others. We support churches and plant new churches as vital places of worship, learning, and justice advocacy. We change lives through our global partnerships, missionaries, and advocacy. Gifts to Our Church's Wider Mission benefit the full range of the United Church of Christ mission across the country and around the globe.

Justice and Mission

Our faith compels us to reach out beyond our walls to care for those in need and build community across lines of race, class, gender, and sexuality. Together, we make a difference in our community, our nation, and the world.

Back Bay Mission



Located on the Mississippi Gulf Coast since 1922, Back Bay Mission is one of the oldest and most highly respected organizations within the UCC. It continues its journey of providing innovative solutions and

compassionate responses to those suffering at the hands of social injustice and economic hardship. Back Bay Mission has a simple mission: to strengthen neighborhoods, seek justice, and transform lives.

Brazos Church Pantry



The Brazos Church Pantry is a local non-profit organization that shares the love of Christ by providing food to those who need it in the Brazos

Valley. The pantry, which operates with no paid staff and with the help of over 30 churches, survives on contributions and about 100 volunteers who work two hours a day, six days a week. Last year, the pantry provided food to more than 38,000 Brazos County residents. The first Saturday of each month, Friends Church volunteers at the Brazos Church Pantry (304A W. 26th Street in Bryan), restocking shelves and assisting clients. The volunteers meet there at 9:45 am. Brazos Interfaith Immigration Network (BIIN)

BI Brazos Interfaith

BIIN is a 501(c)3 non-profit, is a group of individuals, organizations, and faith communities, called to promote the human

dignity and well-being of all immigrants in our community and to advocate for and facilitate better access to legal, educational, and social services. Friends Church is a BIIN partner and as such helps build capacity and strengthen BIIN ties to the community and its resources. We also help spread understanding of the organization and of the contributions and needs of immigrants in our community. (https://brazosimmigration.com)

Faith Inclusion and Disability Awareness Team

Founded in 2014 by members of Friends Congregational Church, this team seeks to explore justice and inclusion of individuals with disabilities into our church community. Since its foundation, FIDA has conducted an accessibility audit of the church to assess the physical access of the church. The team obtained the A2A (Accessible to All) certification from the United Church of Christ in January 2020. The team also participates in Access Sunday to raise awareness of how our congregation can be more welcoming and inclusive for members and visitors with disabilities.

Family Promise of Bryan-College Station




Family Promise is an area-wide, volunteer-based, non-Family Promise profit organization that supports families by providing shelter, meals, transportation, training and support

services to homeless families while helping them secure permanent housing. The program provides a safe environment in which families can stay together and become self-sufficient. It is affiliated with the nationwide Family Promise in Summit, New Jersey. Friends Church is on a rotation of one week of support for families with approximately 12 other host churches in our community. (https://www.familypromisebcs.org)

Members of Friends church began a regular attendance in 2018, choosing the 2nd Sunday of the month as our time to provide food. Anyone can attend and bring some food. Healthy options are best, as are items that can easily be take-out items for a day or so. We also assist in other needs of the participants. (Pilgrims in the Park – Facebook)

Brazos Sanctuary Coalition

This project was initiated with a grant application to the national UCC for a grant from the Neighbors in Need program, to establish a formal sanctuary church network in the Brazos Valley to aid undocumented immigrants who might be in danger of deportation. Friends Church was awarded that grant and our Associate Pastor is leading this effort. The group has formalized its identity as the Brazos Sanctuary Coalition. Friends Church has formally authorized use of its space to provide physical sanctuary should the need arise.

Sustainability Team

In June 2008, Friends Congregational Church unanimously adopted an Earth Stewardship Covenant. The sustainability team assists the congregation in honoring the covenant through linking environmental topics to justice issues in worship and Sunday School curriculum. Additionally, our sustainability team led the way in helping the church convert to using 100% wind energy for its electricity, utilize rainwater barrels to help offset irrigation, and reduce/reuse/recycle by practicing recycling and using reusable cups, dishes, and silverware for church events. In May of 2017, Friends installed solar panels through Texas Green Energy. The team also brought single steam curbside recycling to Friends Church placing several bins throughout the church and placing the curbside containers on the street every other week for collection by Brazos Valley Recycling.



Friends Church Governance

The governing body of this Church is the membership of the Church assembled in a Congregational Meeting.

Congregational Meetings

There will be at least three Congregational Meetings each year. In June, the Congregation will (1) elect officers and (2) receive the annual report. In September, the Congregation will be presented with an estimated Annual Statement of Faith and Mission (estimated budget) for the following year. In December, the Congregation will be presented with an official Annual Statement of Faith and Mission (budget) for approval by vote. If scheduling conflicts prevent a congregational meeting during these specified months, the Church Council will establish a meeting date on the nearest available month. A quorum will consist of FIFTEEN PERCENT (15%) of the members of the church. The number for the quorum will be established each year at the time the official count is sent to the national church.






Church Moderator

The Moderator will set the agendas and preside at meetings of the Church Council and all Congregational Meetings.

- Presides over the monthly Church Council meeting
- Submits monthly reports for publication regarding:
 - o Summaries of each Church Council meeting
 - o Announcements and summaries of each congregational meeting
 - Information regarding any other Church Council event, such as a planning meeting or leadership training
- Notifies all members announcing each congregational meeting
- Meets with pastor/s for prayer, discussion, and development of monthly agenda
- Handles financial issues as necessary
- Works with the Council Executive Team and the Finance Committee
- Assists the Pastor with planning the Annual Leadership Retreat

Church Vice Moderator

The Vice Moderator will assist the Moderator as necessary and will be Moderator for the term immediately following.

- Attends monthly Church Council meetings
- Presides over monthly Church Council meeting if the Moderator is absent.
- Works with the Moderator, Deputy Moderator of Trustees, Treasurer, and Stewardship Leaders to create the Statement of Faith and Giving to present to the congregation at the January congregational meeting
- Assists with duties at the congregational meeting such as: ensures church members sign-in on clipboards, prepares and counts ballots, etc.
- Member of the Council Executive Team and the Finance Committee
- Assists the Moderator and Pastor with planning the Annual Leadership Retreat
- Chairs ad-hoc committees of short duration, as deemed necessary
- Regularly communicates with the Pastor and Moderator

Deputy Moderator of the Board of Trustees

The Deputy Moderator of the Board of Trustees will act as Chairperson of that Board and serve as the liaison to the Church Council from the Board of Trustees. The Deputy Moderator will also work with the Stewardship Ministry Chair in proposing the annual Statement of Faith and Missions (budget).

- The Board of Trustees will have oversight over the building and property
- The Board of Trustees will consist of:
 - Deputy Moderator as Chairperson

- Any action will be in accordance with established purpose and goals of the Church
- All meetings are open, except when addressing personnel issues
- The Board of Trustees will submit an Annual Statement of Faith (budget) for approval by the Congregation at a Congregational Meeting
- Provides a written report to Church Council on a monthly basis summarizing new and ongoing activities of the Board of Trustees' Activities
- Provides a summary for the Friends Annual Report of Board of Trustees' activities for the year

Deputy Moderator of the Programs Ministry

The Deputy Moderator of the Programs Ministry will act as Chairperson of the Programs Ministry Team and serve as the liaison to the Church Council from the Programs Ministry. The Deputy Moderator of Programs will also be responsible for ensuring leadership for major whole-church activities.

- Coordinates with Program chairs to evaluate proposed events as consistent with the Vision and Mission of Friends Church

Church Council Secretary

The Church Council Secretary will announce dates of Church Council and Congregational Meetings, will keep an accurate record of the meetings of the Church Council and all Congregational Meetings of the church, and make minutes available to the Congregation.

Treasurer

The Treasurer will be responsible for the disbursement of all funds, maintaining accurate financial records and reporting the financial status of the Church to Church Council and the Congregation.

- Submits a written report to the Church Council monthly
- Maintains payroll record
- Provides W-2s to church and church related employees

Diversity and Inclusion Representative

The Diversity and Inclusion Representative will serve as a voice for all and work to ensure that we, Friends Congregational Church, hold ourselves accountable, individually as well as collectively, for being a community of faith that is extravagantly welcoming to all. Accountability involves leadership at the (1) individual level, (2) interpersonal level, (3) group level, and (4) community level. In support of the Strategic Plan, the Diversity and Inclusion Representative will facilitate programming opportunities that work to accomplish these goals.


